

Emotionally/Physically Safe Environment – Situation 1

One of the campers has fallen and can't get up! You and your co-counselor are the only two counselors with the group, and you're quite a distance from the main camp. You can't tell how badly the camper is hurt; it will be time for dinner soon; the other campers are scared and nervous. What should you do?

Emotionally/Physically Safe Environment – Situation 2

Two of the boys in your cabin are constantly talking about guns and knives, and they often pick up sticks and start dueling with each other. They've even threatened other campers with the sticks. You're afraid someone will get hurt. What should you do?

Emotionally/Physically Safe Environment – Situation 3

At camp, several campers are overheard making fun of a camper who has a prosthetic leg (artificial leg). They call her a "crip" and laugh when she falls over a root on the path. You have observed this behavior, and you want to do something about it.

Emotionally/Physically Safe Environment – Situation 4

Your campers are excited about planning a skit for campfire. They want to do a skit that features water...the old camp "Oops, Centi Peed" skit. They would like to have the "logs" for Centi's trick be some of the campers from another cabin. The campers will have to lie on the ground, and some will get wet. You're concerned. Why?

Emotionally/Physically Safe Environment – Situation 5

One of the campers forgot his nametag...again! This is the fifth time since camp started that you've had to remind him about his nametag. It's time to teach him a lesson. Your fellow group counselor suggests making him sing in front of everyone to get his nametag back. Another counselor suggests making him miss dinner if he comes in without his nametag. You're not sure what to do.
